Beckman Elementary has developed a Title 1 parent and family engagement policy with input from Title 1 parents. We review this annually with parents and solicit input in the development and agreement of this policy as a part of the Single Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA) and through other site advisory groups, eg. School Site Council (SSC) and English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC). The policy is distributed to parents annually. 2.1 Involvement of Parents in the Title I Program
