

Dual Enrollment Updates and Opportunities

Executive Summary

- Lodi Unified continues to partner with Delta College to expand dual enrollment opportunities.
- McNair high school has piloted dual enrollment classes during the school day with success.
- The other comprehensive high schools have engaged in planning for the past few months and are ready to implement in the Fall.
- We have met with Delta College once a month to plan for implementation, and they are fielding our requests subject to their availability and staffing.
- San Joaquin County A+ has identified LUSD as partners for a design and funding opportunity through Genentech and the Stanford Hasso Plattner Institute of Design (d.school).

Dual Enrollment with Delta College

The current expansion plan:

- Offer two courses at each high school (Bear Creek, Lodi High, and Tokay High).
- Each course will meet two days a week (one course M/W and the other T/Th) from 7:30am-8:30am.
- The additional weekly required class time will be done virtually.
- Board policy regarding dual enrollment credits will be followed. Students will not be able to use these credits to satisfy core high school requirements.
- Courses will likely provide elective options not currently offered through our courses.
- We will request some summer courses and online courses to be offered districtwide during each semester.
- AB288 and other CDE code allow students to take dual enrollment courses and still generate full ADA for districts so long as the courses are offered through a Community College, CSU, or UC and the student attends at least 240 minutes at their K-12 site.
- This will not reduce high school FTE but will lower class sizes.

San Joaquin County A+/Genentech

- Eight Northern California public school districts and their community partners will be selected to join Genentech in utilizing community design approaches to ensure that we are finding opportunities to advance student-centered learning, equity, and the well-being of students, staff, and families during the constraints of the COVID-19 era.
- After the workshop, school districts and their community partners will receive funding from Genentech (\$50,000-\$200,000), coaching, and capacity-building support to implement an idea or innovation of their choice in the 2021 calendar year.
- The workshops will be run by education specialists from Stanford's K-12 Lab at the d.school to provide a structured experience to identify opportunities, generate new ideas with users in mind (e.g. students, teachers, caregivers), and quickly prototype and test them.
- The focus of the project will be to enhance our CTE program and focus on a community project in the area of viticulture, hospitality, and the grape industry.
- Our community partners include the Lodi Winegrape Commission, San Joaquin County A+, and the Lodi Chamber of Commerce.
