Executive Summary



The CDE is preparing a waiver request to the U.S. Department of Education that could potentially eliminate the requirement for CAASPP testing this year. The waiver has not yet been submitted.

CAASPP Testing Recommendation: 2021



The waiver will potentially remove the requirement to administer the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC) for ELA and math in grades 3-8, and 11.



The waiver would also include the elimination of the California Science Test (CAST). The waiver would not eliminate the California Alternative Assessments in ELA, math and science.



However, staff is recommending to move forward with SBAC ELA and math testing for grades 3-8, and 11 this spring.

Executive Summary Continued



IEPs would need to be revised for over 2,500 students to whatever alternative assessments we would be giving before we begin testing in the spring.

Consequences of Not Administering SBAC



The Early Assessment Program (EAP) report derived from CAASPP is used by colleges to determine if students will be placed in remedial courses.



ELA CAASPP is used a criterion for the Seal of Biliteracy.



CAASPP is used as a criterion for the Golden State Seal Merit Diploma.

Executive Summary Continued



There is no 11th grade math course at LUSD. We have 11th graders in various math courses or none. Therefore, no single district developed math test exists that can be provided to our 11th graders.

Consequences of Not Administering SBAC



Federal funding is contingent on implementing state testing as a measure of student progress. Currently, we are not free of state and federal testing requirements. The waiver has not yet been submitted or approved.



Proper LCAP baselines would be difficult to create with alternative assessments and would create issues in terms of measuring growth as we move forward with CAASPP in future years.

Notes from SJCOE

- Once we have approval from the U.S. Department of Education, an Executive Order from the governor or action by the legislature will be required. The CDE staff has been in communication regarding this but can't give the green light until these approvals happen.
- Schools must administer the same assessment (local or CAASPP) across the entire grade level, grade span or school.
- If using local assessments, IEPs need to be revised to reflect the assessment being administered.
- If using local assessments, these must be representative of the ELA and Math Common Core standards.
- The assessments must be able to be reported by various disaggregated student groups.
- Student information will also need to be reported to parents. Reporting requirements can be viewed here: 2020-21 Flexibility Guidelines.
